Atzheimer's Awareness

On Tuesday the 21st September to celebrate World Alzheimer's Day a "Simply Scintillating Sausage Sizzle" was held at Home and Community Care Centre. Over sixty people came to enjoy the atmosphere, munch on a sausage and learn about Dementia services in the Queanbeyan and surrounding area. The event was jointly sponsored by the Department of Ageing, Disability and Home Care and Alzheimer's Association, New South Wales. It was opened by the Manager of Community Services Greater Queanbeyan City Council, Jenny Grinlinton who said that "Australia is facing a Dementia epidemic. Currently 170,000 Australians have a diagnosis of Dementia, with that number expected to reach 500,000 by 2041. Nearly one million Australians already provide care for a person with Dementia....". Allan Neal and Gary Stephenson then struck a chord with the crowd as they sang mellow folk songs to the delight of all (Contact 6299 4628 for gigs).

The day was one of several events run in National Dementia Awareness Week by the Queanbeyan and District Dementia Working Group to raise community awareness about Dementia and its' impact on the community. This week will also see the launch of packs for General Practitioners to give to Dementia sufferers and their carers and the promotion of the next Living with Memory Loss course in March 2005 in Braidwood and an education program on Dementia for nurses and other health workers beginning in November. The Living with Memory Loss course is a seven week course for people in the early stages of Dementia and their carers.

Dementia Awareness Week is an initiative of Alzheimer's Australia, who are campaigning to reinforce that there is "no time to lose" in making Dementia an Australian health priority. In New South Wales over 57,000 people have Dementia and according to Lewis Kaplan, Chief Executive, Alzheimer's Australia NSW there are about 6000 new cases of Dementia each year in the state. During the week Alzheimer's Australia and the Queanbeyan Dementia Working Group encourages all Australians who have noticed changes in their own memory, thinking or behaviour, or those of a loved one, to talk to their GP or to Alzheimer's Australia.

Layers of bird calls as the day unfolds, the background hum of bees as the air gathers warmth, frogs serenading, new shoots pushing up towards the sun from plants long abandoned, yellow wattles, powdery blossoms and stems bursting with bud under a limitless blue sky; seductive spring, brimming with life and promise. And so it seemed fitting, as a bush community, soldiering on under the shadow of drought, that we should have a celebration that reflected all the dazzle and energy of spring. I'm referring to the community bonfire, that once a year spectacle that brings us, young and old, together, to be young at heart again.

This home grown event is ours, and it embraces so many of our local cultural icons. They, the pony club, playgroup, cubs and scouts, the local church and the bush fire brigade, all ensured that we were well fed and watered while we were entertained. Even the monthly produce market got a berth and many of the optimists amongst us went home with dainty treats for the kangaroos and rabbits that we'd left behind to babysit. But one cultural icon, seldom heralded, was by its very nature, missing.the tip.

A tip is a wondrous thing, a final resting place for all that is unwanted, rejected, broken and unloved, yet it is a record of how we live. Like most of us here, we are dab hands at recycling. Whatever leftover that doesn't feed Mort or the chooks or the worms, is fed to the compost heap. Whatever can be mulched is mulched. But we still have to hitch up the trailer and every so often make a pilgrimage to the dump. Other times there has been a line of lolling couches that have seen many an afternoon snooze, or a contortion of tricycles and toys, but this time I was saluted by the Australian flag flying proudly, and a friendly nod.

MOBILE PHONE RECEPTION UPDATE - WAMBOIN & BYWONG

My last update to the community on the mobile phone reception issue was in The Whisper in June following advice I had received from Telstra Country Wide Capital South East Region (TCWCSER) that funding for a base at Poppet Hill had not been secured in Qtr 4 (03/04). TCWCSER also said at the time that the bid would..."be resubmitted for Qtr 1 (04/05) funding where it is now higher up the list..."

I've maintained contact with TCWCSER via email since then to keep track on "developments" and to convey the continuing (and rising) unrest in

the community (locals, tourists to the area and people transiting the locality) with the poor quality of mobile phone coverage in the region.

On 13 September the Investment Manager TCWCSER responded to my emails of 26/8 and 10/9 to advise that ... "Wamboin Mobile Base Station still has not been funded. It is very high on Capital South East Region's priorities and will continue to push for it. At this stage by the time the site is acquired with DAs (Development Applications - my insertion), environmentals etc and the site is built it is likely that this site will be approximately 12 months away. If there are any further developments I will keep you informed.

I have no reason to doubt TCWCSER is doing its best. It advised us in December that our application presented a sound business case. But, after seeking clarification from TCWSER about its 13 September email, it is clear that we were also unsuccessful in the Qtr 1 (04/05) funding round.

ACTION YOU MAY CARE TO TAKE BETWEEN NOW AND THE FEDERAL ELECTION

I am hopeful that we will ultimately see an improved mobile phone coverage across the locality. But there is no room for complacency. It's clear from this community's research that you, other residents, the fire brigade, police, tourists and others visiting or transiting the area, are concerned with inadequate mobile phone coverage in this locality. You may wish to write to or otherwise contact your local member to express your concern and urge them to take effective action. And, there are other, perhaps more effective, ways YOU can make improved mobile phone coverage happen.

WAMBOIN OF YESTERYEAR – by Ian Coillet

Long time resident Robyn Robertson has been quietly carrying on the tradition of painting a picture of Wamboin in its youth by drawing excerpts from issues of The Whisper published 15 years ago. I enjoy the little snippets of history included in The Whisper. Interesting, that in many ways, the issues and challenges that existed then more often than not persist today.

As part of a little exercise to do with our local, yes, our very own, Wamboin Volunteer Rural Fire Brigade, and the upcoming mega gala Official Opening of the Extension to the Wamboin Fire Station on Sunday 10 October (to which the whole community has been invited), I also have been browsing through some really old editions of The Whisper.

The very first issue of the Wamboin Whisper (Issue No. 1) hit the "streets" in July 1981. And guess what, first topic in the newsletter - the Bushfire Brigade. Even in those days, someone close to Robyn's heart, David Robertson was one of the drivers in the community, along with John Finn and others. These people were especially instrumental in the formation of the Bushfire Brigade. Community support, critical then, remains vital to the Brigade's continued functioning today. Wamboin in 1981 was, of course, a mere handful of roads and tracks. I don't know for sure but from Sutton road intersection, Norton road appeared to end around Bingley Way and the Merino Vale area.

The Wamboin Bushfire Brigade was, in a sense, to cut a long story short, a spin-off from the Sutton Brigade. The first fire shed for Wamboin was built in Cooper Road – completed around Jun 1981. In the community then, as is the case today, residents come and go. In August 1981, a community BBQ was held at the Fire Shed in Cooper Road to recognise the imminent departure of two families from the area. In Wamboin, the Bushfire Brigade was, and remains to this day, an important, if not pivotal, link in this community. It warrants everyone's support, in whatever way you can manage.

A series by local vet, Dr Garry McComb BVSc QDAH LIVER FLUKE

During the past month we have seen a number of deaths in cattle in the district caused by Liver Fluke. Deaths in cattle are not as common as in sheep however combined with the effects of the drought and inadequate supplementation, some cattle have become more susceptible to this parasite. One cow that I recently autopsied had the worst case of Fascioliasis that I have seen. Fascioliasis is a disease caused by Fasciola hepatica commonly known as liver fluke. The adult fluke live in the bile ducts in the liver of sheep, cattle, goats and other ruminants. It can also be found in the pig, hare, rabbit, beaver, coypu (haven't treated too many of those rodents!), elephant, horse, dog, cat, kangaroo and man. Sheep and cattle are the main hosts in Australia. In unusual hosts, such as man and the horse, the fluke may be found in the lungs, under the skin or in other tissues. To the best of my knowledge, liver fluke has not been recorded in the horse in Australia.

Adult fluke are leaf shaped, grayish-brown in colour and may reach a size of 30mm x 13mm. They produce eggs (20000 – 50000 eggs per day over a long period) which are passed in the faeces. They hatch when temperatures are above 10^{0} C (mid September to May). The larvae (miradidia) invade the intermediate host, a particular type of snail (in Australia it is Lymnaea tomentosa) and develop and multiply as sporocyst, rediae and cercariae. The tadpole like cercariae leave the snails and swim until they encyst on vegetation, forming metacercariae, which are the infective stage of the fluke. One miracidia hatching from a single egg can produce up to 4000 infective cysts(metacercariae). The entire cycle in the snail takes 2-3 months. These cysts attach to grass and are ingested by the host. The metacercariae excyst in the small intestine and the immature fluke penetrate the intestinal wall and enter the abdominal cavity. They then penetrate the liver capsule and migrate through the liver for 6-8 weeks before entering the bile ducts to become adults and commence egg production 8-10 weeks after infection. (my spell check has been working overtime in that paragraph!!)

Without the snail, the parasite cannot survive. The snail is found in slow moving streams with marshy banks, irrigation channels, seepage areas etc. It may be recognized by its dextral spiral – when the point of the snail is directed towards you, the spiral twists in a clockwise direction. Alternatively, when the snail is laid down with the opening uppermost and the point away from you, the opening is seen to be on the right. It has a maximum length of about 7mm and varies from brown to black in colour. One snail is capable of producing 1000 eggs per month. Snails are able to float and drift with a current for long distances, however they have been clocked at 50cm per hour against a water velocity of 15cm per second. Eradication or control of the snail is difficult. The best solution is to fence off known swampy areas. Stock are more likely to graze low lying areas in times of drought.

Fascioliasis may be acute, sub-acute or chronic. Signs range from weight loss, anaemia, chronic diarrhoea, jaundice and death. Oedema (fluid swelling in the tissues) develops in some animals and causes the characteristic "bottle jaw". Diagnosis in the live animal may be by finding the eggs in the faeces however the eggs are heavy and do not float in normal floatation fluids. There is now a blood test which can be used to diagnose liver fluke.

Treatment or control of the fluke can be achieved with some modern anthelmintics – some will even kill immature fluke. A drench should be given in Spring and again in early Summer. On heavily infected properties, a third drench in autumn may be required.

A newsletter from YOUR volunteer rural fire brigade compiled by Cliff Spong with help from many members of the Brigade (Wamboin Brigade's website is www.wamboin-fireshed.com)

The Fire Season has started. Fire permits are now required if you want to burn off or light fires in the open. Adequate precautions must be taken if fires are lit in the open. Your neighbours and your fire brigade captain need to be notified 24 hours before you light up.

From the Captain's Desk

Before I get into the news about the brigade I have acknowledge the help and good wishes from many people in the brigade over the past few weeks. It took some time to get the hint about what I really needed to do to get over some respiratory problems I was experiencing. Our Senior Deputy Captain and the Deputy Captains stepped in and quietly and efficiently managed things. It is times like these when one is reminded what a great brigade we have in and for our community.

Over the past month many people have requested fire permits to burn off rubbish piles which have been building up. We will endeavour to meet these requests whenever we can but as the weather warms up and the conditions aren't so favourable we may not be able to issue them as freely as now. Time and conditions will tell. Luckily there have only been a few reports of people burning off without a permit. We

are obliged to investigate all of these reports and while these burn offs may not result in a large fine, in the first instance, an official letter will be sent from the Fire Control Centre. It is in everyone's interests to be alert to any signs of fire, and if in doubt, call 000 and report it.

It is a good time now to check all your fire fighting equipment. When was the last time you ran your petrol-powered pump? Can it still get water to where you might need it? Have you cleared the mudwasp nests from your fire hoses and sprinkler systems? Have you checked your emergency plans? When did you last check the batteries in your emergency radio? Where can you find more information? A good place to start, if you have access to the Internet, is the brigade's website. If you don't have Internet access, please give me a call and arrangements can be made for a visit to your property. Your brigade is but a phone call away, as always.

We have been fortunate over the past month, as things have been a little quiet. A stark contrast to the previous month, but we remain thankful. It has given us some time to carry out some maintenance on our vehicles and other fire fighting equipment in the shed.

It has taken us some time and a LOT of effort from MANY dedicated people in the brigade to build the extension to the fire shed. The end is in sight and the opening ceremony will be held on Sunday 10 October at 2pm. We are very pleased and proud of the results. The improvements and changes will really assist us in providing a better service to our community. It is also something everyone in the community can be proud of. A sophisticated alarm system has been donated and will be installed to help protect this important community asset. We would be pleased to see you at the opening. You will be able to see what your donations over the years have provided.

What is hazard reduction? For some people the answer is pretty clear but I have had a few questions recently and I thought that an explanation might help. Hazard reduction is any activity that reduces or removes fuel before the onset of a bushfire, so as to minimise damage to life, property and the environment if a bushfire does occur. Under the *Rural Fires Act 1997*, land managers and owners are responsible for conducting hazard reduction to protect existing dwellings, major buildings or other assets susceptible to fire.

A Bush Fire Hazard Reduction Certificate or other environmental approval may be required to clear or burn. A permit to light a fire is required for burning hazards, during the Bush Fire Danger Period. Hazard reduction either significantly reduces fuel levels around assets so they are less likely to be affected by fire, or provides adequate space for people to work in while fighting a fire.

Complete removal of fuel means an area will no longer support fire, however, such a practice may be harmful to the environment. The more common practice is to reduce the amount of fuel, in which case the fire would:

- generate less heat and be less dangerous for firefighters and the general public
- travel more slowly
- have a lower flame height and be less likely to develop into a crown fire
- be less likely to produce embers that cause spot fires.

Methods of hazard reduction include:

- Hand clearing raking up leaves, clippings, clearing out gutters.
- Mechanical clearing mowing, slashing, ploughing, bulldozing or grading.
- Burning pile burning or activities known as controlled or prescribed burning which use fire to reduce the amount of flammable fuel.

In many circumstances, hand and mechanical clearing methods should be considered, as they could be the best way to protect assets. These methods can be safer than burning, easier to organise and maintain.

Hazard Reduction burning should involve experienced landholders or qualified firefighters to ensure the fire does not escape and the operation is carried out safely. Adequate equipment and protection measures are needed. Many factors need to be considered including:

- weather conditions, (wind, humidity, temperature)
- availability of personnel to work on the fire
- the impact the fire will have upon local residents and other stakeholders
- the impact of the activity on the environment.

If you notice a fire at any time please call 000. Phoning 000 is the quickest way to get the right help for any type of emergency in rural areas.

Wamboin Community Association's Fireworks Display

I have just paid my Vet's bill for \$245.00, and I am not happy. I had to call the Vet out last Sunday (19th September) because on an injury sustained by one of my horses, caused by the noise of the fireworks display on the previous evening. I was aware that the fireworks display was to be held on the Saturday evening, because of the great deal of publicity which preceded the event. At the appropriate time, I locked my dogs inside the house and gave them all a sedative, because they hate fireworks and go berserk. There was not much I could do about my horses, apart from stay with them whilst the display was running. From experience gained from previous years' fireworks displays, I was concerned for their safety, as fireworks terrify them, even though we live over a kilometre from the Community Centre.

The first part of the display which could be seen from my property, was not too bad, although the horses were nervous and jumpy. However, the last few explosions which, I assume provided the finale, were outrageously loud in my opinion. My horses became terrified and bolted down the far end of the paddock. It took me about 30 minutes to pacify them, but by then the damage had been done. One of my mares had seriously injured one of her hind legs, and could barely walk.

I called the Vet the next day, and he spent over an hour with her. Luckily, no permanent damage appears to have been done, but the animal still cannot walk properly, although she is improving.

The reason for this letter is to ask why we hold fireworks displays at all in a rural area, where so many people have horses, dogs and other animals, most of which are terrified of the sight and sound of fireworks. It seems crazy to me. I understand that the Community Association rates the fireworks display as one of their best fund raisers, and it has been held annually for the last 20 years. That may be so, but I think it is about time that we grew out of fireworks, considering the pain and suffering inflicted on animals which have no idea of what is happening to them. The ACT seems to have outgrown such displays. I will happily contribute to whatever function the Community Association wishes to hold, provided we forget about the fireworks.

If the Community Association continues to hold fireworks displays, there will come a time when somebody's horse or other valuable animal is seriously injured and will sue the Association because of it. I hope that the Association has a good liability insurance policy because I supect that they will need it. I would be interested in other residents' views on the topic.

Sutton Road - Proposed Road Works

Road safety improvement works have been proposed on Sutton Road for a number of years. The Federal Government have provided \$4.6m to upgrade Sutton Road through the "Roads to Recovery" program and works have now commenced on a project to implement some of these proposals.

The first stage of the project works was to remove hazardous trees from close to the road and clear trees to enable future road realignment. The contract for this work was awarded to local contractor Contour Constructions and occurred over the weekends of 11/12 and 18 September. Closure of the road was originally notified for three weekends to allow for wet weather and any other unforseen delays, however with good weather and excellent progress the works were completed early and the road opened ahead of schedule.

The main road works contract has been awarded to local contractor Guideline ACT Pty Ltd. on 9 September and allows for complete rehabilitation of the road for 3.3km south of the ACT Border. Works include provision of a 2m wide shoulder on both sides of the road, installation of guard barriers, realignment of the "S" bends on the hill just south of the border and provision of a 600m long northbound overtaking lane approximately 1km south of the border. A further \$1.0m may become available for the project in which case the rehabilitation will be extended to cover a further 900m south of the current limit of works.

The works are scheduled to commence on 12 October for completion in April 2005 weather permitting. There will be intermittent delays to traffic during the construction period with traffic control generally by temporary traffic lights with half the road closed for lengths of up to 1km. This may cause delays of up to 10 minutes and road users are encouraged to allow for delays in expected travel times or use alternative routes where possible.
